

About SLATE, SHAPE, SHARE

Last year, these three events (SLATE, SHAPE, and SHARE) were held in Hiroshima, Japan and preceded the 70th Remembrance and Memorial Ceremony. As a result, the number of submissions and participants was nearly double the number or submissions and participants for this year. We deeply appreciate the tireless effort and commitment to confidentiality and professionalism of our reading and editorial committee members. The combined number of abstracts received was 112. The distribution was as follows:

- SHARE: 19 submissions with 14 accepted (73.6% acceptance rate)
- SHAPE: 22 submissions with 18 accepted (81.8% acceptance rate)
- SLATE: 71 submissions with 56 accepted (78.8% acceptance rate)

We employed a double-blind review system. Readers were asked to use a scoring rubric that assessed areas such as originality, clarity/organization, spelling/grammar and suitability for the respective event.
